

TOP OF THE MOUNTAINS CONFERENCE FREE TIME ACTIVITY OPTIONS

The spectacular beauty and solitude of the 217,000 acre Sawtooth Wilderness is experienced by people from all parts of the country. It is considered the "crown jewel" of the Gem State. The Sawtooth Wilderness is exceptional in scenic beauty and is characterized by high granite peaks and narrow glacial valleys. The Wilderness is comprised of hundreds of jagged peaks, 50 over 10,000 feet in height, with nearly 400 high alpine lakes dotting the predominantly rocky terrain. Also hidden within its boundaries are deep, secluded valleys covered with enormous stands of trees. These mountains hold the headwaters of the North Fork and Middle Fork of the Boise River, the South Fork of the Payette River and contributes significantly to the headwaters of the Salmon River. Nearly 350 miles of trails provide a wide range of routes and many of the high lake basins do not have constructed trails to reach them. The Wilderness offers opportunities for recreational, scenic, scientific, educational, conservation and historic purposes.

During the free time blocks, there are many enjoyable and family-friendly activities to do in the Sawtooth region. We recommend planning out your free time blocks to make sure you plan enough time to do the activities you want to. Additional research may be required to ensure you have all the information you need for the specific activity and what extra items you want to pack for that activity.

RECOMMENDED ACTIVITIES:

- Spend the day at Alturas Lake, Petit Lake, Redfish Lake or Perkins Lake
 - There are day use parking areas (for a fee). You can bring kayaks, rafts, canoes or a canopy and camp chairs and enjoy these beautiful mountain lakes. Take a picnic lunch and spend the afternoon!

- Tour Custer Ghost Town & Dredge
 - Custer is a well-preserved ghost town in the Stanley area. On your way to the ghost town you'll pass the dredge, which offers guided tours.
